Col. W. H. Yankes - of White Oaks

1895April23; In a recent interview Deputy Sheriff Mayer, of Lincoln county, gave the New Mexican a most satisfactory account of the great gold mines at White Oaks. ...[Old Abe Eagle mine] W.M. Hoyle, a twelfth owner, is superintendent in charge, and James McDonald is foreman. Before the fire about fifty men all told were employed in the mill and mine and in hauling. ...work was started up on the North Homestake, which has been idle for three years, by the owners, Messrs. Yankes & Johns, of Denver, and this has given a fresh impulse to the camp. ...[South Homestake mine] This mine is under the successful management of E.W. Parker, superintendent, and Joseph Giesharber, foreman. ...B.H. Dye is down about 200 feet on the Solitaire, between the North and South Homestakes, and will soon have a mill. ... [SFDNM]

1895June12; Col. Yankes, superintendent of the North Homestake at White Oaks, returned from Denver Wednesday. [SFDNM]

1896February14; W.H. Yankes returned yesterday from a trip to his mines at White Oaks, N.M. "White Oaks," said he, "I consider one of the best gold districts in the country. The ore is all free milling quartz and is very rich. The district is not a new one, having been worked for many years. It was first discovered by some Texas people, who went out there with cattle, the country being an ideal grazing section. They found the free gold sticking out of the ground, and, though they knew nothing about mining, they managed to get rich by digging to the best of their ability. The principal mines in the district are the Old Abe, Little Mac, South Homestake, North Homestake, Lady Godiva, Rip Van Winkle, Soltaire, Comstock, Homestake, South and Sager. There are three stamp mills in the district, two of 20-stamps each and one of 15-stamps, and two Huntington mills. [SFDNM]

1897May14; Colfax County. John Baker a widely known miner, who for 25 years has mined and prospected in Colorado, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico and Old Mexico, in company with Frank Johns is at Elizabethtown looking over the county in the interest of Col. Yankes of White Oaks. They will remain at this point for the summer. [SFDNM]

1900February22; Thomas C. Johns, a mining man, known in Colorado and New Mexico, died in a New York inebriate asylum last Tuesday. Mr. Johns was 53 years old, and he came to Colorado in 1868; that is, at the age of 21 years. He is said to have opened the first mine at Silver Plume and brought the first Cornish miners to the state. At times he was reputed to be quite wealthy, and at others he lost heavily in what he had invested. W.L. Yankee and Mr. Johns operated in New Mexico four years ago. Their claims included the North Homestake near White Oaks. ¶ Besides the widow and two daughters in Denver, Mr. Johns left one son, Cash Johns, of Cripple Creek. [SFNM]

Milton J. Yarberry (d.Feb1883) - of Abq

Saturday, June 18, 1881, Milton J. Yarberry, a constable of the then new town of Albuquerque, shot and killed Charles D. Campbell on First street, Albuquerque, after the latter had fired at him from a revolver. He escaped from jail on September 9, while awaiting trial, but three days later was captured in the Arroyo Galisteo, in Santa Fé county. Six weeks before, Yarberry shot and killed Harry Brown in Albuquerque in a quarrel over a woman. Brown was the youngest son of ex-Governor Neil S. Brown, of Tennessee. Yarberry was a native of Texas, began his career of crime by killing a freighter in Texas, and afterward was the associate of a gang of desperadoes in that state. He killed several other men there. Yarberry was hanged in February, 1883. [History of New Mexico, G.B. Anderson, 1907 p.240]

1881May18; Yarberry who killed Harry Brown the Express guard at Albuquerque some months ago was tried last week at that place and acquitted. [SFDNM]

1881December20; At chambers yesterday Judge Prince had before him the case of Milt Yarberry, accused of murder at Albuquerque, on a writ of habeas corpus. ...bond ...\$10,000... [SFDNM]

1882March31; Milt Yarberry who killed Campbell has employed Edgar Cayless, of Santa Fe, to defend him. ...Only a short time before his client killed Campbell Yarberry was tried for murder and cleared. The feeling against him at Albuquerque was intense, and he was brought up to Santa Fe for safe keeping. [SFDNM]

1882May12; Sheriff Romulo Martinez of this county and deputy sheriff Romero of Bernalillo county went down to Albuquerque yesterday afternoon with Milt Yarberry who has been confined for a number of months in the Santa Fe jail. Yarberry is the man who killed Campbell at Albuquerque only a few months after he had been acquitted upon a charge of killing Harry Brown, the express messenger. He is to be tried at the present term of the Albuquerque court and the general opinion is that he will not get off so easy. [SFDNM]

1882September15; Somebody gave Yarberry money at Lamy Junction. Whoever did it is a very poor friend of the law abiding people of the territory. [SFDNM]

1883September28; Milt, where are those bats and ball you were going to send the boys from Texas? The two nines here are about broke up awaiting their arrival. [The Golden Retort. Vol.III No.20]

1883October5; Bell would not, and rightly, grant Milt Yarberry bail because he stood charged with murder in the first degree, the poor friendless devil. With Whitney, in a special car, brother of a railroad president, reputed wealthy and influential and Stover as a go-between, the case was quite different. [The Golden Retort. Vol.III No.21]

Only one person was executed by the use of weights and pulleys: Milton Yarberry. In early 1883, Yarberry went to his grave in Bernalillo County for shooting a man while serving in the capacity of a police officer. In this type of hanging, the neck was broken by the shock of being josted upward into the air through the release of heavy weights. A subsequent downward movement insured that the person was dead. [NMHR Fall2004 p.532]

The condemned was tied to one end of a counter-weighted pole balanced on a fulcrum. The counterweight, perhaps with the help of ropes and pulleys, was released from above, jerking the man, just seconds ago standing, high into the air, where, it was hoped, he would thrash and die. Yarberry, however, was killed when his skull smashed on the ceiling, his captors having failed to take into account the height of the building. The device was used only twice. 1939January; Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Yarbrough and three daughters and grandchild stopped a little while to visit friends in Cerrillos. They were on their way to Silver City where two of the girls are attending college. 1895November15; Chas F. Yardman has returned from Cripple Creek and other Colorado mining camps. He claims that Cochiti is good enough for him. [SFDNM]

1896February10; Mr. Yardman, the skillful mill-wright and mining man, now a resident in this city, for a score of years has stuck to a certain group of mines adjoining the famous Bassic mine at Silver Cliff, Colo., and he has now been informed through his Chicago attorneys that the property referred to has been sold to an English and Boston syndicate. The terms or exact figures are withheld for the present, but it is understood on good authority that it ranks up in the thousands. [SFDNM]

The school is divided into three classes, the Bible class under Mrs. James, the intermediate with Mrs. James Carruthers as teacher, and the infant class under the supervision of Mrs. J.T. They state that about twelve months since two American went to their office and asked to see some rough diamonds and rubies. They were evidently unacquainted with precious stones, but after looking at the first lot of rough diamonds, for which £800 were asked, they asked to see some larger ones and some rubies, and they selected, without reference to weight or quality, rough diamonds and rubies to the value of £1,495. During the week they bought more rough diamonds and rubies, and their purchases altogether amounted to nearly £3000. The weight of the largest diamonds was from seven to eight carats, which corresponds with the weight of the largest stones yet discovered in Arizona. They said they were or had been contractors on the Pacific Railway in America. The fact that they were totally unacquainted with diamonds and rubies – that they never weighed them and did not inspect them singly – left an impression on Messrs. Keller's minds that these diamonds and rubies were bought for a different purpose than cutting. Early this spring they sold to an American gentleman, recommended also by the above parties, about 1,100 carats of rough diamonds mostly of an inferior description." [SFDNM]

Alex Sanders worked with Griswold and Goldfields Corp. (Pioneer airlines, not Goldfields Ltd.) and they put a winze in the Swann tunnel at the end of the Apex shaft. Joe Schmit worked with them. The project ended over turmoil about unionizing it. [per BHenderson 2010]

Joe Meeks with Ira Young lived at the mine in the brick house. Williams was Raskob's engineer. Raskob in 2 or 3 years took \$1million in ore out; invested the money in FL. Raskob sold the place to Williams for \$25k. The brick house was vandalized. In 1948-49 BHenderson works it. The prisoners were housed in the brick house. BH moved to Abq in 1950. [per BHenderson 2010]

Guadalupe Baca went into the last San Lazarus claims with BHenderson, and with Ira Young, who had the copper mine, to get samples for a patent for those exceptions. [per BH 3Jul2010]

YUBA CONSTRUCTION COMPANY - New Placers

In the spring of 1917, the Yuba Construction Company commenced the construction of a five-foot dredge for the Santa Fe Dredging Company. The timbers for the wooden hull were placed on the company property at Golden, near the dredge pond, already constructed. Four carloads of equipment are now stored at Stanley, this equipment consisting of 51 – 5 cubic foot buckets, all the necessary wire cables, electric motors, structural iron and bolts, and the necessary construction tools. ¶ The dredge specifications call for a modern 5 cubic foot close-connected type boat of the best construction, to dig 40 feet below the water line, and of a rated capacity of 1,000,000 cubic yards per year. ¶ The Yuba Construction company agrees to complete the dredge within five months of the receipt of certain deposits and orders to proceed with the erection of the dredge. ¶ There is now installed a well-equipped steam power plant of 200 K.W. capacity, coal to be hauled from the mines at Madrid, 15 miles distant. However, it is proposed to purchase power from the Power Company at Madrid and erect the necessary 12 miles transmission line. ¶ The Power Company is now estimating the price of power and states that such price will be less than 3 cents per K.W. hour for power used. Certain places, generally at the foot of a valley or opposite a break in the mountains are richer than others, but all the gravel carries gold in small quantities. The gravel is very coarse at the immediate foot of the mountains, and becomes somewhat finer in the remoter portions. It varies from sand to boulders and lies from 20 to 30 feet deep on the bed rock. During the greater part of the year this material is perfectly dry. The gold is mostly very coarse and little water worn, and in many cases appears in wire and in flat scales, just as it came from the vein. The richest streak is naturally next to the bed rock. [M.B. The Zeckendorf brothers came from Independence, Missouri, to Santa Fé in the year 1854. Louis, Aaron and William Zeckendorf were born in Hanover, Germany. The Zeckendorf firm became firmly entrenched in Santa Fé. Aaron Zeckendorf came to Santa Fé first and later he was joined by his brothers, Louis and William. They opened a branch at Albuquerque and another at Rio Mimbres (Deming, New Mexico). In 1872, when Aaron died, the business was continued by Louis and William as the Zeckendorf Brothers. In 1878, when William retired, the business was continued as L. Zeckendorf and Co. During the deflation which followed the Civil War, the brothers found themselves with too much merchandise. They had heard about the little town of Tucson from passing immigrant trains. They were told that the town was prospering. Consequently, Louis left Albuquerque for Tucson with a train of twelve wagonloads of merchandise. It took four months to traverse the long stretch across the Apache country to Tucson. A scarcity of merchandise made it a simple matter for Louis Zeckendorf to sell the entire shipment. In 1868, the Zeckendorfs decided to repeat the shipment and they started for Tucson with sixteen wagonloads of merchandise. However, the situation had changed in Tucson. There were no buyers. They were compelled to open a store to sell their merchandise. They rented a small adobe room and opened for business. Thus the A. and L. Zeckendorf firm was born. By the time the Southern Pacific Railroad had reached Tucson in 1880, Albert Steinfeld, the nephew of Aaron Zeckendorf, at the age of twenty-six, had already become manager of the firm that was to become Albert Steinfeld and Company. Aaron Zeckendorf wrote his name on the wall in 1871. The Zeckendorf brothers, Aaron, Louis and William, made history in New Mexico and Arizona. The Zeckendorfs operated a great mercantile store that later was taken over by their nephew Albert Steinfeld. Zeckendorfs are cousins to Spiegelberg bros.

Strapped to the wagon was William Burley, a member of the outfit, who had become a raving maniac on Saturday and had slashed his own throat because he imagined a posse of a hundred men was after him to lynch him for insulting the wife of a railroad conductor. Mr. Zimmerman J.E. Haines and Burley had camped Saturday afternoon at Ortiz, being on their way to Santa Fe from the O'Mara coal fields. Burley had several epileptic fits during the day, but was quieter in the evening, although he muttered in his sleep about a posse being after him and hammering at the door. Late in the evening, just as Zimmerman and Haines had gone to sleep, Haines was awakened by Burley bending over him and feeling warm blood trickling in his face. "I have done it; they won't get me now!" said Burley, as he slashed a pocket knife across his throat from ear to ear. Haines jumped up and awakened Zimmerman, and both, after half an hour's wrestling, overpowered Burley and took his knife from him. Burley then with his fingers tried to tear open further the gash he had inflicted on himself. He was quieted after a while and the flow of blood from one of the arteries in the throat was stopped by the application of flour and sugar, the only remedies at hand. Zimmerman and Haines sat up all night watching Burley, who several times tore the bandage from his throat and opened the wound again. Yesterday morning the trio started across country for Santa Fe. About 15 miles from the city Burley became violent again and with the assistance of two other men whom they chanced to meet Zimmerman and Haines tied him to the bottom of the wagon. The party arrived here shortly after noon and Burley was taken to the county jail, where medical help was rendered him. His injuries are not necessarily fatal, as the jugular artery had not been cut, but the bitter cold of Saturday and Sunday may have aggravated his case. [SFNM]

Held's *A Spy's Guide to Santa Fe and Albuquerque*, published this month by The University of New Mexico Press, tells how Zook's Drugstore served as a safe house for a Soviet secret agent 70 years ago. ¶ The author says a Lithuanian-born, Argentina-raised, French-educated KGB agent named Josef Grigulevich used the store at 56 E. San Francisco St., now the site of the Haagen-Dazs shop, as his base for the assassination of the Russian revolutionary in Mexico City nearly 1,200 miles away. ¶ Grigulevich did it, Held says, by initiating a relationship, possibly a romantic one, with Katherine "Katie" Zook, the daughter of Zook's owner. ¶ "Katie became a well-known figure in Santa Fe society, famous for her erect carriage, long braids coiled on her head, and her love for fancy hats," he wrote. "She was often seen around town on her daily walks with her beloved dog, Tillie, or driving her bright-red convertible. She traveled the world extensively. She never married." ¶ Like most women of her time, the only daughter of pharmacist John Zook kept a low public profile. A computerized search of *The New Mexican* through the 20th century found only a half-dozen mentions of Katie or Katherine Zook — the first on June 6, 1963, when a society column noted that Sherry Flanagan, a junior at Arizona State, was in town visiting her aunt, "Miss" Zook. Other articles in the 1970s were about her winning bridge tournaments. She died in 1998 at El Castillo Retirement Residences. – In 1940, when Grigulevich arrived in Santa Fe, John Zook, a pharmacist in town since 1904, was 65 and ready to retire. Katie, who was running the drugstore, was 33. Grigulevich, code named "Padre," was 27, "cosmopolitan, and a ladies' man akin to James Bond," Held wrote. "There are no available public records to provide insight into any personal relationship between Katie and Grigulevich. She most likely didn't even know his true name." Joe Oreste Zucal (b.AUSTRIA 1893 d.1952) - wife is Luisa M. Zucal (b.AUSTRIA 1903>; of Cerrillos

Louis Zucal was born March 10, 1923, in Cerrillos to Giuseppe and Louisa Zucal. His parents had immigrated from Romeno, a village in northern Italy, and were part of the state's first generation of miners who worked in Raton, Socorro, Madrid and Cerrillos. After becoming injured in a mining accident, Giuseppe Zucal supported his wife and five children by opening the J.O. Zucal General Store. The store became a fixture in Cerrillos from 1928 until the family patriarch died in 1952. ¶ "My father had one of the first liquor licenses in the state," says Louis Zucal. ¶ Not only was the store popular with locals, it also inspired Zucal to become a doctor. "People were always coming in, describing their various ailments, and my mother would recommend different types of patent medicine that we sold," he says. ¶ After graduating from St. Michael's High School in 1940, Zucal attended New Mexico State University, where he joined the ROTC. When World War II broke out, Zucal was sent to Camp Roberts, Calif., for infantry training. "When the training was over, I told the military review board that I wanted to be a doctor," he says. ¶ After his training at Baylor Medical School, he did an internship in Kansas City, Mo. Because the Army helped pay for his medical training, he went to Okinawa after the war for a year, he says. ¶ Zucal was married to Bernice Thompson for 56 years, and they had three children. ¶ The couple were active in the community, doing charity work until he retired in 1993. ¶ In 2004, Bernice died of pancreatic cancer. Their four grandchildren keep Zucal busy, and he enjoys reminiscing about the early days of his medical practice. ¶ "Back then, there were only 13 doctors in town," he says. "I was always on the go. I had offices in Cerrillos, Madrid and Santa Fe. When you first start out, you don't know if you're going to make it, so I would go on house calls to Stanley, Chimayó and Santa Cruz, wherever I was needed. I used to charge \$3 an hour!" The Evelyn property, comprising the Brown, Evelyn, Manhattan, Santa Rosa, and Shannon lode claims, lay on the north slope of Santa Rosita Mountain, at the north edge of the district. The first recorded operators were WH & RB Paul, in 1910; the owner at that time was the Evelyn Gold-Copper Company. In 1912 the ownership had passed to Page Rodman and WG Franklin. The greater part of the production, probably amounting to 1,500-2,000 tons, was mined by Alec Mathieson and Joe Zucal in the late 1920s. The property has been idle since 1930. In 1945 it was reportedly under lease to W Simonson, of Denver Colorado and Alec Mathieson, of Cerrillos. According to available information, the ore shipped was a siliceous oxidized ore containing about 21/2 percent copper as malachite and 0.2 ounce of gold per ton. The main ore body, which was mined in a small open pit at the collar of the Evelyn shaft, was said to have been 40 feet deep and 40 feet across. ¶ The Evelyn property included seven veins that dipped steeply to the northwest or southeast, in augite-biotite monzonite. The vein thicknesses ranged from 6 inches to about 5 feet. Only the gossans were exposed, which showed altered rock and veinlets of quartz and chalcedony, highly stained with limonite and manganese oxide. Here and there were a few specks of malachite, pyrite, and chalcocopyrite. The veins were opened by shafts, pits, shallow cuts and three drifts and adits. The Evelyn shaft was said to be 247 feet deep and is inaccessible. [Disbrow&Stoll 1957]

Zucal was born March 10, 1923, in Cerrillos to Giuseppe and Louisa Zucal. His parents had immigrated from Romeno, a village in northern Italy, and were part of the state's first generation of miners who worked in Raton, Socorro, Madrid and Cerrillos. After becoming injured in a mining accident, Giuseppe Zucal supported his wife and five children by opening the J.O. Zucal General Store. The store became a fixture in Cerrillos from 1928 until the family patriarch died in 1952. ¶ "My father had one of the first liquor licenses in the state," says Louis Zucal. ¶ Not only was the store popular with locals, it also inspired Zucal to become a doctor. "People were always coming in, describing their various ailments, and my mother would recommend different types of patent medicine that we sold," he says. ¶ After graduating from St. Michael's High School in 1940, Zucal attended New Mexico State University, where he joined the ROTC. When World War II broke out, Zucal was sent to Camp Roberts, Calif., for infantry training. "When the training was over, I told the military review board that I wanted to be a doctor," he says. ¶ After his training at Baylor Medical School, he did an internship in Kansas City, Mo. Because the Army helped pay for his medical training, he went to Okinawa after the war for a year, he says. ¶ Zucal was married to Bernice Thompson for 56 years, and they had three children. ¶ The couple were active in the community, doing charity work until he retired in 1993. ¶ In 2004, Bernice died of pancreatic cancer. Their four grandchildren keep Zucal busy, and he enjoys reminiscing about the early days of his medical practice. ¶ "Back then, there were only 13 doctors in town," he says. "I was always on the go. I had offices in Cerrillos, Madrid and Santa Fe. When you first start out, you don't know if you're going to make it, so I would go on house calls to Stanley, Chimayó and Santa Cruz, wherever I was needed. I used to charge \$3 an hour!" Strikers formed a line outside the power house so workers couldn't get their batteries – 1 to use, 1 as a spare – and thereby couldn't work that day. The next day a pile of rocks appeared on the strikebreaker side of the road, and the strikers were pelted and gassed. J.Henderson functioned as emissary between Kaseman (eastside) and the strikers (westside). Henderson, carrying a hidden pistol, was accosted on the bridge across the arroyo by a fervent striker with a rifle, and other strikers calmed the situation. [per BHenderson 9Oct2010]

- 1934December18**; Huber, in explaining the position of his company, said that it was operating under the most stringent mining laws of any state in the union which increased the overhead, that its production in recent years had been cut in half and that it had to meet increased competition from other forms of fuel and the business wouldn't stand many increased costs in production. ¶ William Zurek, president of the Madrid local, said in addition to the wage scale, the miners were striking for recognition of their union and for a definite contract. Few men are paid alike at the Madrid mine, he said, and the men are paid what the company gives them. He said he insisted on a uniform scale. ¶ Huber said his company was willing to deal with the union but contended there should be differentials in the classification of underground labor and that the company should not pay \$5.10 per day for the two classifications which appeared to be the major center of dispute. ¶ James Morgan, labor representative on the [Bituminous Coal Labor] board, said Monday night as the meeting adjourned that he was not entirely discouraged and was hopeful that something would develop as the hearing resumed Tuesday morning to bring the two sides into agreement. [AbqJournal]
- 1936February12**; Drizzling rain and a cold raw wind did not deter more than a hundred striking workers today in their second day of peacefully picketing the Madrid mines of the Albuquerque and Cerrillos Coal company. ¶ Claims of Oscar Huber, mine superintendent, that 81 men braved the picket lines to go to work this morning were disputed by union leaders. ¶ James R. Lord of Denver, district representative of the united mine workers of America, and Williams Zurek, president of the Madrid union local, said only 43 men were on the job today. ¶ The picketing continued without disturbance and followed the same routine as yesterday. They formed lines past which the workers had to walk to get to the lamp house for lights. ¶ When the shift was in, the strikers marched to the edge of town, where Zurek and Lord spoke, urging a continued "solid front" and declared the strike would be won by "playing square and abiding by the law." They said ample food supplies were available to continue the strike. ¶ Lord told the pickets that this camp is "a testing ground" and if the strike is successful here in gaining a contract for the union with the company it will liberate all workers in New Mexico and "assure decent wages and working conditions." ¶ He told them once the strikers succeeded here the union's efforts would be carried to other fields. ¶ The six state police here this morning ordered the pickets to stay on the west side of the main street, whereas yesterday they operated on the east side of the north and south thoroughfare. As a result, it was not necessary for the workers to pass through the picket line today but only to pass by. ¶ Lord told newspaper men the police "apparently were leaning" toward the coal company, and asked if Governor Clyde Tingley was in his office. ¶ He said Zurek had referred the Madrid case to the national coal board in Washington, set up under the Guffey act, he added. ¶ "The board may rule on our problem today. We don't know yet. Maybe it won't until tomorrow." ¶ Superintendent Huber said there were eighty-one diggers in the mine today, an increase of eleven over yesterday, but that all told, there were nearly two hundred men at work inside and outside the mine. He said the total payroll for the mine as of Feb. 1 was 385 men. [Las Vegas Daily Optic]

This was denied by strike leaders. ¶ Although pickets vigorously heckled the ingoing workers, there was no untoward incident. Chief E.J. House of the state police and five patrolmen were on duty this morning. ¶ Oscar Huber, mine superintendent, said there were 91 men in the mine working, and 112 or more outside. James R. Lord, United Miner Workers district representative, claimed only forty-three men went into the mine this morning, the same as asserted yesterday. ¶ The dispute, which arose over the employment of E.R. Davis, company policeman, and now enters around the strikers' demand for a contract and agreement under the Guffey act, appeared stalemated. ¶ Lord declared he would send the men back into the mine only after the company signed a "full contract." ¶ Huber, on the other hand, said Lord had failed to carry out an asserted agreement to meet him in Santa Fe Monday and negotiated settlement. ¶ Picketing routine today was unchanged. Workers formed in line and marched to a point near the ball park where a short meeting was held. ¶ Lord told the men to "stay put, noting can beat you." ¶ Lord also voiced strong protest against the presence of state police, and said he was going to try and get them removed. ¶ William Zurek, UMWA local president, told newsmen Cerrillos merchants had agreed to furnish strikers with groceries. Huber, however, said only three merchants at Cerrillos, he understood, agreed. "one of these objected and others are getting strike relief business, but did not agree to contribute. The other was a saloon," he said. ¶ The company store is not selling any liquors during the strike. ¶ Lord reiterated he "expects a decision against the company from the labor board today." Huber, however, said he had not received "any bill of particulars and no decision could be given." ¶ Lord, who with Zurek left for Santa Fe soon after the pickets dispersed, declared "I am ready to negotiate with Huber on ten minutes notice any day." ¶ "There is no doubt of the outcome. We feel a majority of the men want to go to work and do not only through fear," Huber said. ¶ He replied to Lord's offer to negotiate with the statement he was no presented any contract."
